## 日本橋

Nihombashi  
MAP P23 B-3



Nameplates on the ends and overhead of the bridges were written by Yoshinobu Tokugawa, the final Shogun of the Edo Era.



If you look closely at the pedestal that the giraffe sits on, you can see that its toes stick out. The sculpture was made first, so it doesn't fit the pedestal.

Burn marks from the Great Kanto Earthquake remain on the back of the bridge arches, and traces of incendiary bombs from World War II can be seen in the paving stones.



There are a total of 32 lions on the bridges (8 lions on each of 4 bridges). Some of the lions are not just on the bridge, but on the sides.



Japanese armor's store **KINOKUNIYA** on the 2nd floor of a mixed use building along Yaesu Kitaguchi Dori has a selection on par with a museum.



## 八重洲

Yaesu

The remains of **Kitamachi Bugyosho**, where the famous Edo magistrate "Toyama no Kin-san" worked, stand within Marunouchi Trust Tower North.



**TEMPURA TENDON TENYA**, the affordable tempura chain, has spread to countries across Asia. Its history started from the **YAESU SHOPPING MALL** district right next to Tokyo Station.



**Tamagawa Aqueduct** drew water from the Tama River as a source of fresh water for Edo City. There are traces of Tamagawa Aqueduct on the passage in front of the Marunouchi Trust Tower Main Galleria.



This decoration was hung in the front entryway of **Katakurakan** the company which formerly owned the world heritage site "Tomioka Silk Mill". It is on the 1st floor of Tokyo Square Garden.



The roof of the **Ginza Ichome police box** imitates the design of the main pillars of Kyobashi Bridge, a bridge in fame next to Nihombashi Bridge.



**Kyobashi Park** adjacent to the public hall is also the former site of a prestigious dojo which the famous swordsman Izo Okada once belonged to. The park has distinctive benches.



## 京橋

Kyobashi

Kyobashi is the **starting place of many famous things**. There are many monuments here including those for "The Birthplace of Edo Kabuki", "The Ruins of Riverside Vegetable Market", and "The Birthplace of Ginza".







These trees were used to observe the changing seasons as a guideline for announcing when cherry blossoms are in flowers each year. They stand behind the Japan Meteorological Agency, on the promenade along the Nihombashi River.



大手町

Otemachi

The **Earthquake Gingko Tree**, which survived the roaring flames of the Great Kanto Earthquake, stands in a green space next to the intersection in front of the Japan Meteorological Agency.



This coquettish **gold-bronze statue** personifies the auspicious "golden beetle". It stands in front of Kandabashi Park, near the Kandabashi intersection.



This is the **starting point of the Hakone Ekiden** (New year marathon), in front of the Yomiuri Shimbun building. A statue of a runner stands at the Ekiden finish point.



How "Marunouchi" is written in Japanese depends on whether it is the address, the place name, or the subway line. The "no" in the middle can be written as either "の" or "ノ".



丸の内

**Tokyo Prefectural Office**, the predecessor to the Tokyo Metropolitan Government building that now stands in Shinjuku, was once stood here as a beautiful Western style building. It has now been converted into the Tokyo International Forum.



有楽町

Yurakucho

The high rise section of the Marunouchi Building stands above the low rise section. Low rise is set to a height of 100 shaku (about 31 meters), and this is commonly referred to as the "31 meter line".



Next to the "International Arcade" located under the railroad girder that stretches from Yurakucho to Shimbashi, there is a mysterious tunnel that appears to be an **entrance to another world**.



This is a monument to the song "Yurakucho De Aimashou" (Let's Meet In Yurakucho). The popular song representative of the Showa Era brings back nostalgic memories of Yurakucho in the 1950s.



"**Raimu-raito**" is on the 7th floor of the Shin-Marunouchi Building. It is a women's only "snack" bar which keeps the Showa Era atmosphere. Men may only enter if accompanied by women.



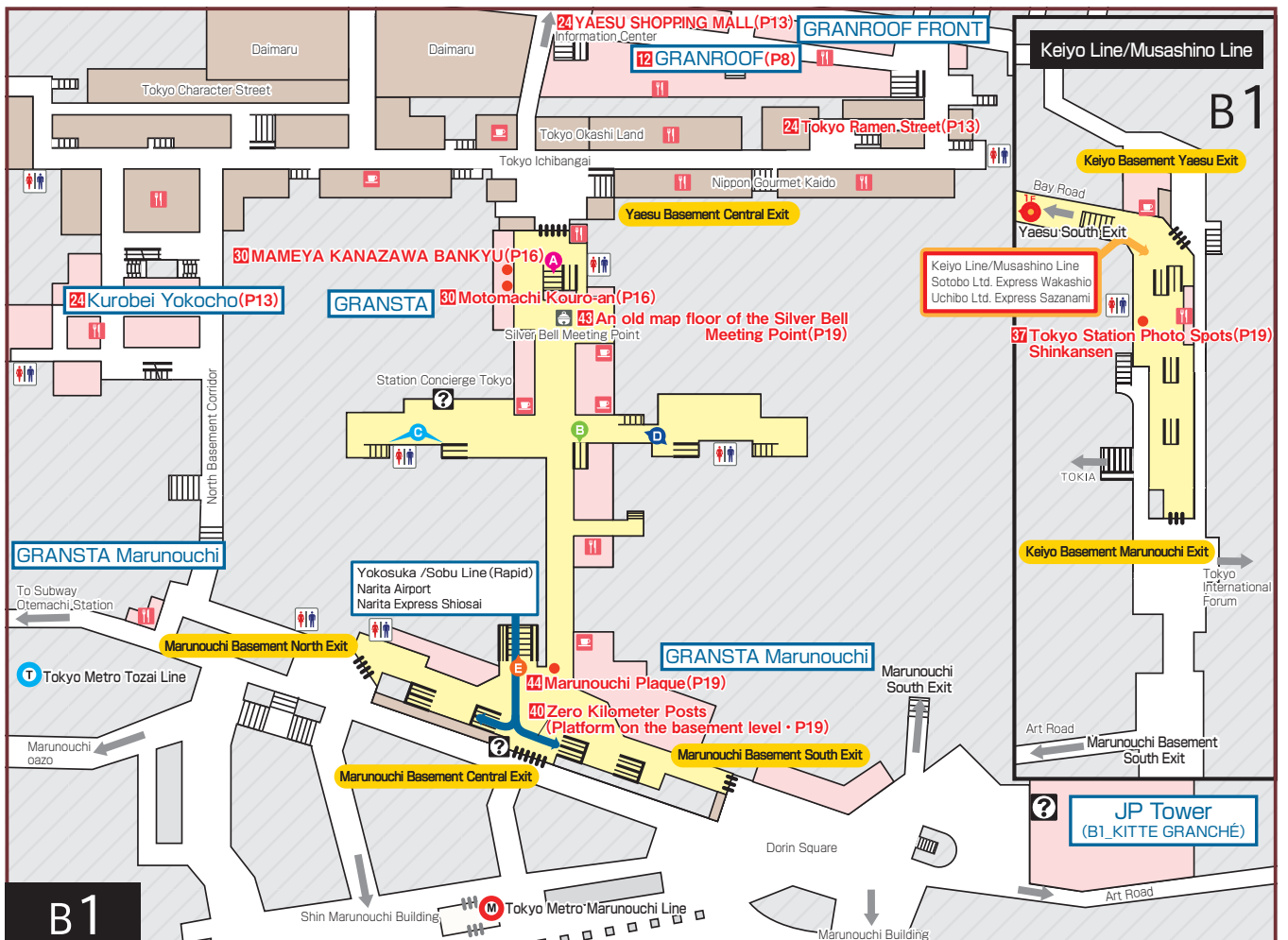
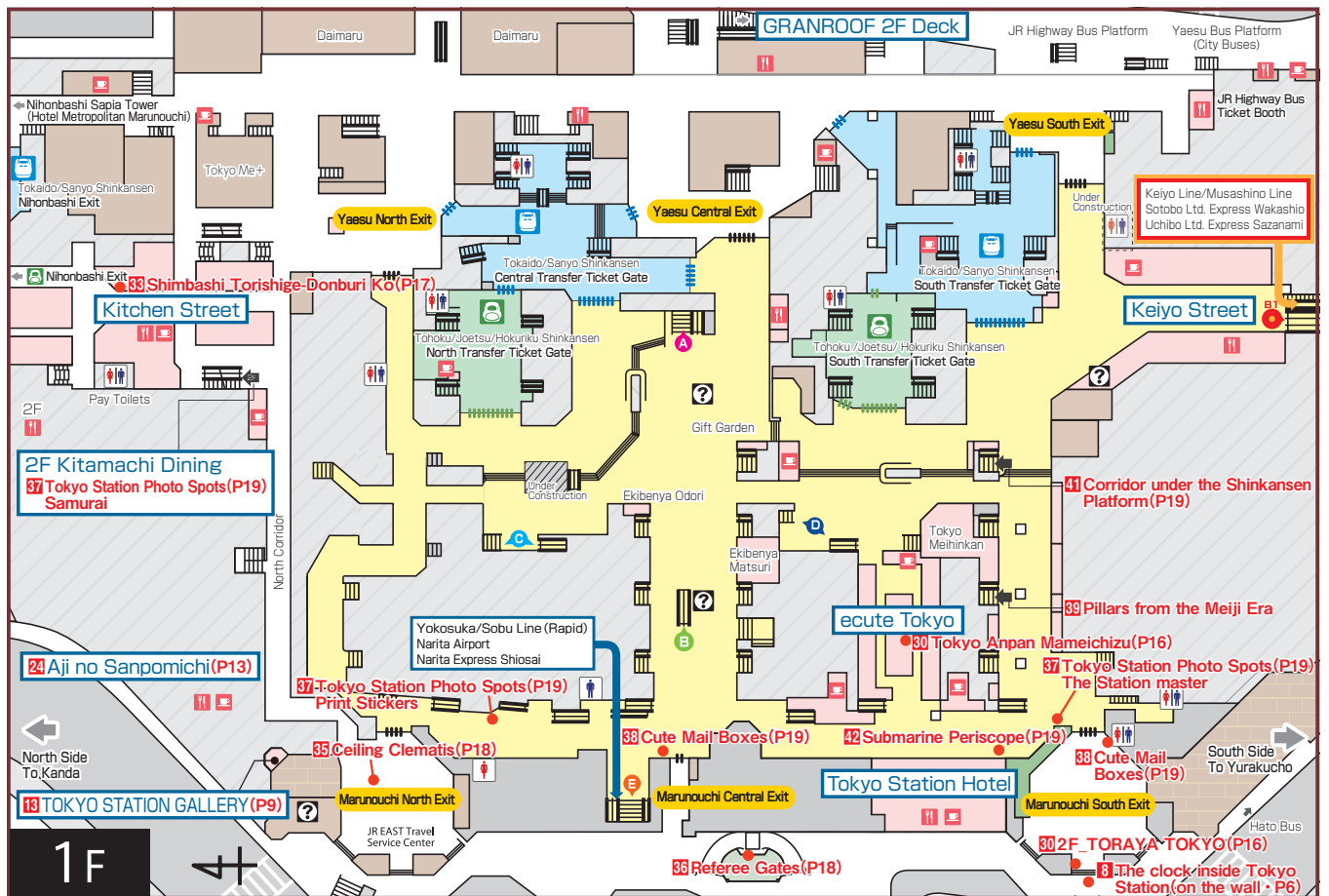
"**Hototogisu**" the historic haiku magazine started in Marunouchi brought many literary works and authors to the world, including Natsume Soseki.

"**Bunka Yokocho**" shimmers at the end of a mysterious tunnel. These restaurants were established in 2010 on the former site of a large tavern. You can enjoy provincial mountain food and seafood, and local cuisine. It is open 24 hours (Some stores excluded).
